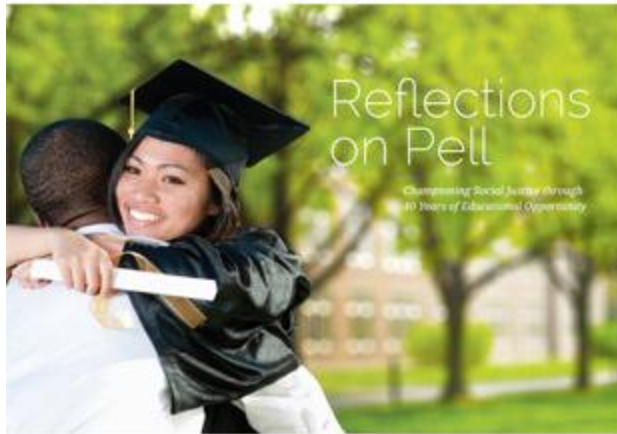



Reflections on Pell — Championing Social Justice through 40 Years of Educational Opportunity
